#### Principal's Message

Recently, we have observed increased challenges related to peer relationships among our students. As educators, we understand the critical impact of positive peer interactions on academic success and personal development. We are committed to addressing these issues with evidence-based practices to ensure our approaches are effective and grounded in solid research.

Basing our professional responses on proven research allows us to implement interventions that have been shown to lead to better educational outcomes for all students. In this light, I would like to share some valuable insights from two renowned experts in the field: Dr. William Glasser and Dr. Gabor Maté. Their theories and practices provide a strong foundation for fostering healthier and more supportive peer relationships within our school community.

I encourage you to read the following passage for more information on the best practices and theories advocated by Dr. Glasser and Dr. Maté, which we will be integrating into our approach.

As we endeavour to provide the best educational environment for your children, we continuously seek to incorporate the most effective and compassionate approaches to support their growth. In this pursuit, the insights from William Glasser's "Choice Theory and Reality Therapy" and the psychology of Gabor Maté offer profound guidance.

William Glasser emphasises that "we choose everything we do" (Glasser, 1998), and this premise forms the foundation for understanding the importance of our students developing their own sense of purpose. Glasser's Choice Theory posits that the best successes come from an internally motivated place. He suggests that "we are where we are because of the decisions we choose to make" (Glasser, 1998). By helping our students recognise their ability to make choices, we empower them to take responsibility for their actions and steer their lives toward fulfilling their goals and aspirations.

Glasser introduces the concept of "total behaviour," which encompasses our actions, thoughts, feelings, and physiology. We use these behaviours to get what we want to satisfy our basic needs:

love and belonging, power, freedom, fun, and survival. When these needs are met, students feel content and engaged. Conversely, when there is a breakdown in a relationship, such as with peers, teachers, or family members, it often results in feelings of unhappiness and frustration. Glasser notes, "All long-lasting psychological problems are relationship problems" (Glasser, 1998). This insight highlights the critical role of nurturing positive relationships in our students' lives.

Complementing Glasser's theories, Gabor Maté's psychology underscores the importance of understanding the root causes of behaviour by asking, "What happened to you?" instead of "What is wrong with you?" Maté emphasizes that every child has a story and that their behaviours are often responses to their experiences. By respecting and seeking to understand each child's unique story, we can establish relationships of trust and respect, which are essential for meeting their needs and fostering their development.

As educators, it is vital for us to recognise that every child comes with a unique set of experiences that shape their behaviour. Mate's perspective helps us to approach our students with empathy and understanding, allowing us to support them more effectively. By building strong, trusting relationships, we create a safe space where students feel valued and understood, which is crucial for their emotional and academic growth.

We encourage you, as parents, to reinforce these principles at home. Support your children in making thoughtful choices and reflecting on how their decisions impact their lives and relationships. By understanding and addressing their needs within the context of their relationships, we can work together to help them develop into responsible, motivated, and compassionate individuals.

Thank you for your continued partnership and trust as we navigate this journey together.

#### Diocese of Cairns welcomes the appointment of Bishop-elect Joe Caddy

Diocesan Administrator Fr Kerry Crowley has welcomed the appointment of the Very Reverend Joe Caddy AM VG as the 8th Bishop of Cairns. "I welcome Bishop-Elect Joe Caddy. His appointment is timely as we have waited and prayed for a 'prayerful & pastoral Bishop". Fr. Joe's background has been in grassroots ministry. He comes well-placed to grow the seeds already planted in the Cairns Diocese".

Fr Caddy was ordained to the priesthood in the Archdiocese of Melbourne in 1990 and is currently the Vicar-General of the Archdiocese.

"I am certain the people, religious, priests and agencies of the diocese will wholeheartedly welcome Bishop-elect Caddy," Fr Crowley said.

"He brings with him a wealth of experience in pastoral care and is a passionate advocate for social justice, and I am sure will be a great asset for the diocese."

Fr Caddy was born and raised in Melbourne. He holds a Bachelor of Theology from the Melbourne

College of Divinity and a degree in Social Sciences from the Gregorian University in Rome, where he studied Catholic social teaching, social ethics, and economics.

He served as CEO of Catholic Care (Greater Melbourne, Geelong and Gippsland) from 2004 to 2017 and was engaged in Victorian and national policy and program development in the areas of homelessness, juvenile justice, refugee and asylum seekers, disaster response, drug and alcohol treatment and local government.

In June 2018, Fr Joe was recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours list when he was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in the General Division for "significant service to the community through a wide range of social welfare initiatives and policy reforms, the Catholic Church in Australia".

As Vicar-General in the Archdiocese of Melbourne, he has taken a key role in revitalising the church and building the skills of clergy and laypeople in the areas of leadership, pastoral care and administration.

Bishop James Foley retired as Bishop of Cairns in August 2022, having been appointed to the role in July 1992.

#### Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes: year of schooling

category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be

able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. This will start in term 3.






1.40—Presentation of Shield
